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

Limits of the current approach

Donor protection and access to healthcare: two conflicting realities?



- The issue of **self-sufficiency is then shifted to that of access to care**, and the dimension of donor protection then appears secondary.
- Debate too often restricted to the study of the balance between supply and demand, or even to the question of donor remuneration, even though the complexity of the subject calls for a broader framework of analysis

The result is an inability to meet today's challenges, both in terms of supply and health protection



Health protection: what are we talking about?

- **Health protection**: "Values and principles common to healthcare systems in the European Union... universality, access to quality care, equity and solidarity" (Council of the EU conclusions of June 22, 2006 on the values and principles common to healthcare systems in the EU).
- + Prevention, continuity of care and the best possible health safety
- On a legal basis: constitutional law of many European countries + a number of international texts

(The EU Charter, the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights, the United Nations Resolution on Mental Health and Human Rights...)



Health protection: a human fundamental right



- Human fundamental right: abstract notion, set of rules that govern the behavior of Man in society, define and guaranteed in a state governed by rules and democracy, and sometimes at a geographical level
- Human fundamental rights involved in the Blood chain: respect for dignity, the right to personal integrity and autonomy, non-discrimination and the right to health protection
- Not Universal but a strong legal basis to guarantee them: sometimes constitutional and find in many international texts

(Charter of Fundamental Rights of the EU, Oviedo Convention, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the United Nations Resolution on the Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners...)

The benefits of Health protection as a global perspective

Patients:

- Infectious risk mitigation
- Access to PDMPs

Donors:

- Primarily seen as relevant to mitigate risk for the recipient of the blood components
- Now: need to improve Donor health protection



Take home messages

An opportunity to define now the standards for tomorrow



- Health protection, as a human fundamental right, offers a strong legal basis for action and internationaly shared objectives
- Europe is a relevant and functional scale to make health protection a political ambition as a whole, based on human fundamental rights and ethics
- Protecting both patient and donor is possible, in a holistic approach to health protection, where the search for a <u>common Good</u> could allow certain market rules to be waived
